Hy-Flex Teaching:

HyFlex combines the terms "hybrid" and "flexible." As a student in this class, you have the option to attend face-to-face instruction, attend live via zoom, or watch recorded lectures on your own schedule and attend asynchronously. You also have the option to switch back and forth between any of these options at any given time.

I still recommend for you to attend in person if possible as these students perform the best. Attending asynchronously is allowed but not recommend as it takes a special type of student to stay motivated and not fall behind.

Course Description:

The last of a four-course series in the Digital Design Graphics Technology A.S. Degree program. Study in technical 3D animation, video editing, and compositing. Study of Adobe After Effects as a tool for video compositing, motion graphics design, and animation. Students will work together on a group project showcasing all of the skills they have learned in the two-year program. Students will put together and post a resume and portfolio with animated demo reel on their student websites. Students will prepare for Autodesk Certified Professional Exams.

Student Learning Outcomes:

- SLO1: Autodesk Certificate of Training AutoCAD Advanced SLO1 Assessment will be based on the Ascent Quiz.
- SLO2: Ability to implement technical skills in video compositing utilizing the Adobe After Effects software.

SLO2 Assessment will be based on the "After Effects Logo" assignment.

SLO3: The ability to create a portfolio video utilizing all programs and skills learned in the DDGT program.

SLO3 Assessment will be based on the assignment: "Final Project".

<u>Course Objectives:</u> Upon successful completion of this course, the student will have the:

- 1. Effectively implement advanced skills utilizing CAD software
- 2. Create complex three-dimensional models
- 3. Successfully rig and animate complex assemblies for animation purposes
- 4. Implement their knowledge of mechanical assemblies into video animation
- 5. Create and animate particle systems
- 6. Utilize multi-pass rendering techniques to create and render out professional level animations as frames
- 7. Effectively use digital visual effects, motion graphics, and compositing software
- 8. Perform video post-production operations
- 9. Utilize Autodesk and Adobe software in the same three-dimensional environment
- 10. Successfully work with multiple audio and video tracks in a non-linear video editor or compositor
- 11. Successfully work in a group project
- 12. Organize a large scale project to successfully meet milestones and deadlines
- 13. Properly maintain an organized file folder-structure
- 14. Maintain proper file backups for large scale projects
- 15. Work on individual tasks while working as a group
- 16. Create and post a professional level website showcasing their final project
- 17. Create a professional level video and post it on their project related website
- 18. Take Autodesk Certified Professional level exams



Canvas Grading:

You can login online to Canvas at any time to see your current grade and it is encouraged to do so. This is your way to verify that the work you have submitted has been properly and accurately entered. If there are any issues, please inform the instructor for correction or clarification.

I do not like the way that Canvas does the grading. It will tell you at the beginning of the semester that you have 100% and that you have an A. This is impossible as you have not submitted any work at this time. The reason Canvas does this is because it only factors in graded work into your final score. Anything I have not graded is ignored. This is confusing and gives the student an inaccurate and inflated idea of what your final grade actually is.

To resolve this issue, at the beginning of the semester, I will go into Canvas and mark ALL of your grades at "0". This will understandably cause anxiety for many students as it will tell you that you have an "F". Although this will give you a more accurate representation of the points you have earned, it will state you have a poor grade for the majority of the semester up until the very end once I factor in your Final. This is normal. If you have any questions about where you are at in the class, please feel free to reach out to me or discuss it with me in one of our monthly meetings.

Please download and install the "Canvas" app on your phones to be notified of grade changes and possibilities of cancelled classes.

Assignment Scores:

You will be asked to work on multiple assignments at once. Each assignment will have a due date either posted on our department website, on our "Assignment List" handout, or on the board at the front of the class. Assignments may only be turned in once. You must submit the assignment before the due date in order to earn full credit. Any assignments turned in after the due date will be penalized 12.5% - you will only be able to receive a maximum of 87.5% on that assignment.

Quiz Scores:

Quizzes are to be taken online through Canvas. All quizzes will be open book. Students will have one week to take the quiz after the course material has been covered during class lectures. Quizzes will have time limits so make sure you set aside a time when you will not be distracted or pulled away from the quiz.

If you are in need of special accommodations through DSPS, please notify instructor in advance.

There are no makeups for missed quizzes unless you contact me prior to the quiz AND you are sick or there is an emergency.

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Final Exam / Project:

The Final Exam / Project is worth 30% of your final grade. This will be based on your individual and group contributions. There will not be a final exam.

Cheating on a test shall result in a failing grade on that test. If you have been found cheating, you will receive no credit for that test or assignment. If it is found that have copied an assignment from another student in the class, then both parties will receive no credit for that test or assignment.

Drafting Lab Etiquette and Policies:

Note: Due to Covid, I will ask that you sit at the same workstation every class. I will ask that you do not sit at computer workstations that have already been reserved by students in other classes. This way, no one will be sitting at your workstation except you and we can prevent the spread of germs.

- 1. Lab computers are to be used for DDGT course purposes only. **Working on projects** for other classes during your class time is not allowed. (Some open lab time, other than your scheduled classes in DDGT may be made available to you. At these times, you may request to use a workstation for other class work. This type of use will be on a case-by-case basis and you must receive prior approval from the instructor before using the Open Lab time for other than DDGT projects.)
- 2. Lab computers are used by many other students during the day. Do not adjust or customize the display (monitor) or the workings of the computer in any way. This includes background wallpaper on the desktop and resolution settings of the display adaptor or adjustment of the actual computer monitor hardware. (If you need special accommodation for a visual problem or otherwise, make a request and we will review your consideration.)
- 3. Lab computers are used by many other students during the day. Please shutdown your computer before leaving for the day. You may leave the computer monitors on as they will go into "Stand By" mode.
- 4. Internet access is a privilege. Do not access questionable websites. Do not download and install any software or games. Access to the internet is limited to needs for projects in the DDGT Courses. Any other access is not allowed without permission. (On occasion, you may request to access the Internet for personal use. If your request is granted, it does not override the directive regarding software/game downloads or installations. You will need to clear this type of use on a case-by-case basis.)
- 5. The DDGT lab computers are for learning and studying. Do not play computer games of any kind on the DDGT Lab Computers. Playing solitaire or other games on the DDGT computers is not allowed. Unless by chance you have created the artwork and programmed a computer game as part of a DDGT course project, there will be NO computer games played in this lab. Playing computer games is something that you can do at home, on your own computer, in your own time.

- 6. Do not touch the computer monitor screen with any items or especially with your fingers. There is absolutely no reason why anyone needs to touch the monitor screens. If you wish to point out something on your screen to another person, POINT WITHOUT TOUCHING! If you cannot seem to help yourself, use the eraser end of your pencil to point with and do not touch the screen with that either! If your monitor is found to be all fingerprinted up, you may lose access to the DDGT Lab Computers. If you happen to accidently touch the screen, you may use the cleaning spray and cloths available to you in the lab. DO NOT use any other cloth except for the ones designated to you. If you are unsure, ask the instructor or DDGT Technician for assistance.
- 7. Each student is required to clean their CAD workstation before leaving the classroom at least once a week or as needed. Ask Instructor or Assistant for cleaning supplies.
- 8. Please keep in mind at all times that computer use in this lab is not your private business. All access on this network is logged and may be reviewed at any time. The activity on your screen when you are working in this network can and may be recorded for later review as well.
- 9. Please set cell phones to "vibrate" during class times. Take all phone calls outside. Do not take phone calls during lecture or demonstrations unless it is an emergency and do so quietly. Keep in mind that you may miss vital information during a lecture.
- 10. Students may keep drinks / food at designated areas at the back of the room. Water in a closed container may be kept by students on the floor at work area. Please eat outside or in the kitchen area. Privileges may be revoked at any time if policies are abused. Any garbage that has food in it should be disposed of in the garbage cans OUTSIDE of the building (there are garbage cans located on the north and south ends of the building). No gum chewing allowed in class.
- 11. Talking during a lecture other than to a student to clarify something that is not clear will not be permitted. If you do not understand something, ask the instructor. I will be more than happy to assist you. If your question is not answered, come and see me after the lecture and we will go over the topic until everything is clear.
- 12. The rest rooms are located on the north end of the building. You may leave the class at any time to use them without asking permission. Keep in mind that you may miss vital information during a lecture.
- 13. Lab hours are available regularly. It his highly recommended that you take full advantage of the CAD workstations during these times.
- 14. Lockers are available at the back of each room for your convenience. Do not utilize the lockers during other classes. You will be required to supply your own padlock. Note: Locks are to be removed at the end of the semester.
- 15. If you know that you will be tardy or absent, you must contact the instructor of your class to let them know ahead of time.

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- 16. In the event of a major disaster or emergency, the instructor is to lead the students to the grassy area between the 1700 and the 2000 (between the new library and science buildings) or to the sports track.

- 19. Please keep in mind that at all times the webcam you are using is being recorded and you should refrain from utilizing your computer for private business. The activity on your screen when you are working in this class can and may be recorded for later review as well.
- 20. When attending class meetings online using Zoom or a similar technology, students are expected to conduct themselves and participate as if they were in a live classroom. This means students must at least have a working microphone and use it to participate in discussions and to respond to questions posed by the instructor. The online live class experience is more effective with a working camera and students are strongly encourage to participate in live class sessions with their cameras turned on.
- 21. Normally, live class sessions conducted on Zoom will be recorded. Assume that all class sessions will be recorded. Access to recordings of class sessions is restricted to class members only and should not be duplicated or distributed in any manner.
- 22.
